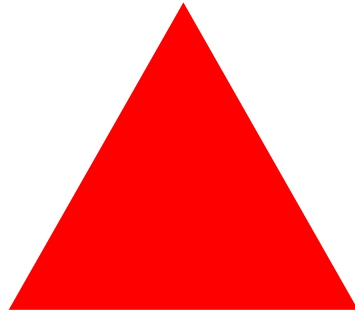

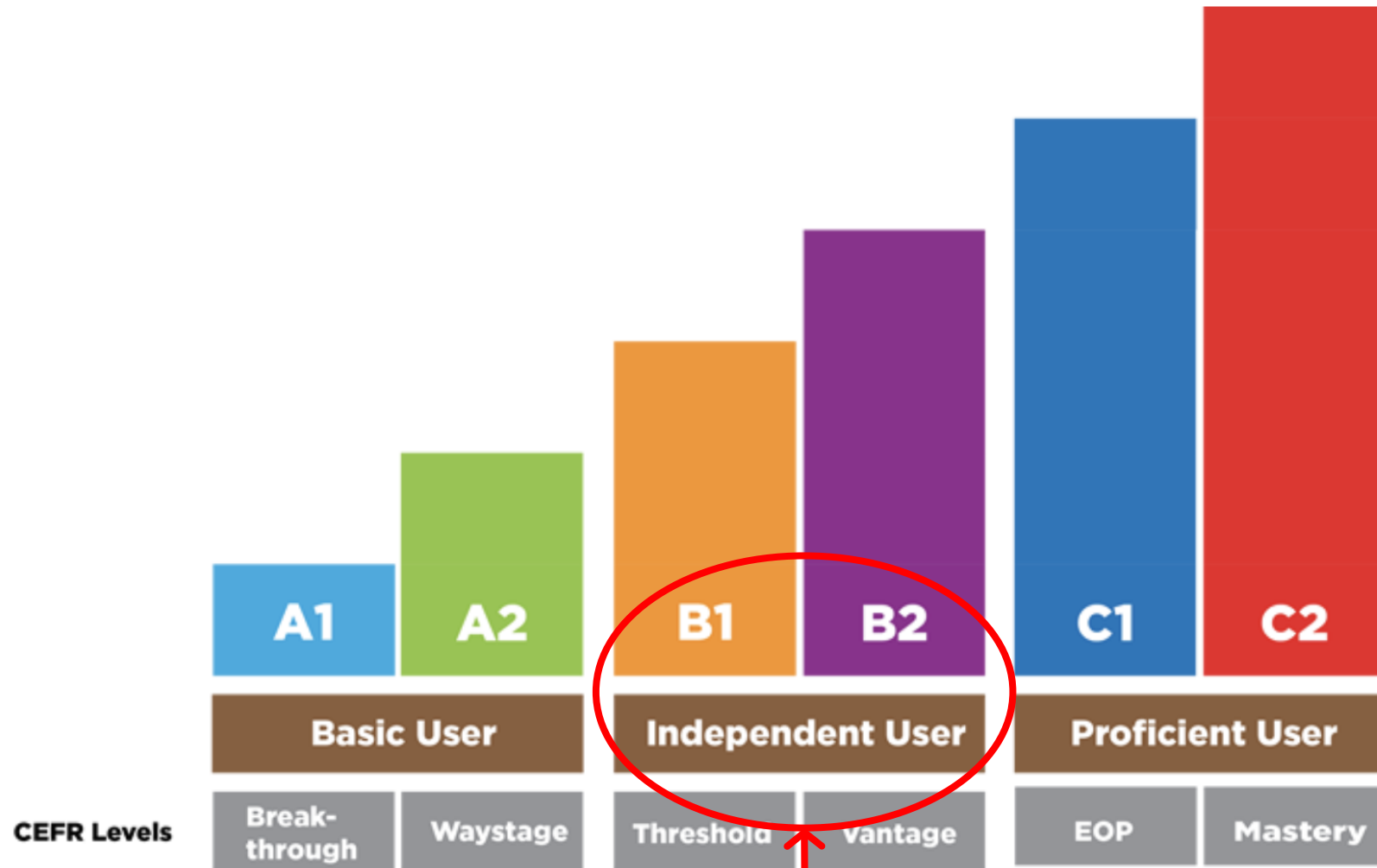

What CEFR B2 actually measures:

Overall Reading Comprehension	
B2	Can read with a <u>large degree of independence</u> , adapting style and speed of reading to different texts and purposes, and using appropriate reference sources selectively. Has a broad active reading vocabulary, but may experience some difficulty with low-frequency idioms.
Reading Correspondence	
B2	Can read <u>correspondence relating to his/her field of interest</u> and readily grasp the essential meaning.
	Can understand what is said in a personal email or posting even where some colloquial language is used.
Reading for Orientation	
B2+	<u>Can scan quickly through several sources</u> (articles, reports, websites, books etc.) in parallel, in both his/her own field and in related fields, and can identify the relevance and usefulness of particular sections for the task at hand.
B2	<u>Can scan quickly through long and complex texts</u> , locating relevant details. <input type="text"/>
	Can quickly identify the content and relevance of news items, articles and reports on <u>a wide range of professional topics</u> , deciding whether closer study is worthwhile.

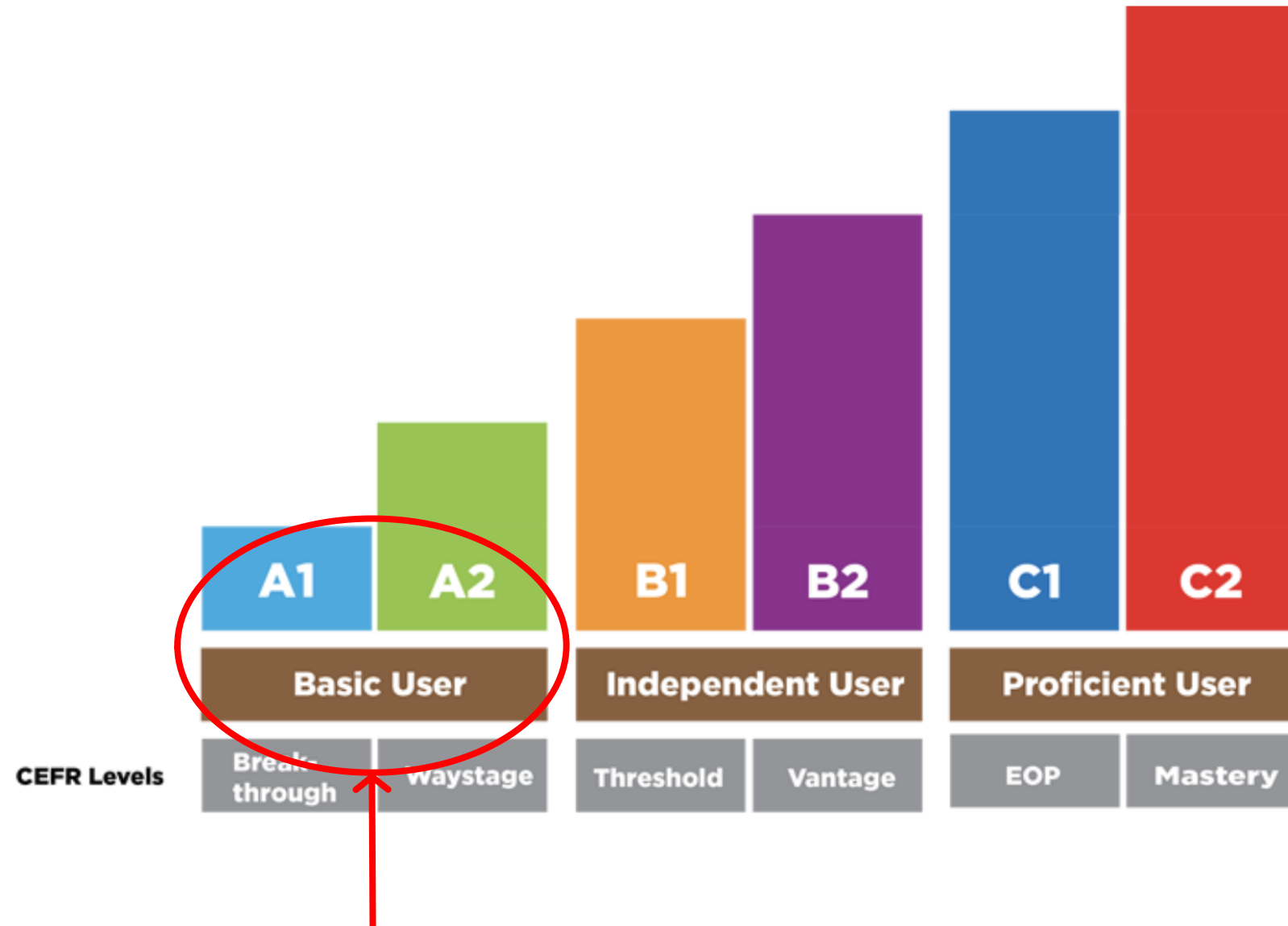
