

TENSE	USE	EXAMPLE
WILL + INFINITIVE	for predictions about future for spontaneous decisions or offers	I think Munich <u>will win</u> . <u>I'll help</u> you with the bags.
GOING TO + INFINITIVE	to express that you have already decided to do something for predictions about future based on a present situation	We're <u>going to get</u> a new car soon. Look out! We're <u>going to crash</u> !
MODALS (MAY, MIGHT, COULD)	to express that something is likely to happen in the future	She <u>might take</u> the bus to get home.
PRESENT SIMPLE	after time expressions (e.g. <i>as soon as, until, before</i>) for timetabled events	Will you stay here until the plane <u>takes off</u> ? The film <u>starts</u> at 8.
PRESENT CONTINUOUS	after time expressions (e.g. <i>as soon as, until, before</i>) for events arranged for a certain time	I'll think of you when I'm <u>lying</u> on the beach next week. I'm <u>seeing</u> the doctor tomorrow.
FUTURE CONTINUOUS	for actions in progress at a time in the future	This time tomorrow I'll <u>be sitting</u> on the plane.
FUTURE PERFECT	to say that something will be finished before a certain time in the future	The builders say they <u>will have finished</u> the roof by Tuesday.
