D Question words as the subject

When a question word is the subject of a question do not use do/does/did Sometimes the question word is the subject of the sentence Who met you at the airport? Who did you meet in Argentina? (you is the subject) (who is the subject, you is the object)

What did you do? What happened? Who do I pay? Who works here? (you and / are the subjects) (What and Who are the subjects)

Note that auxiliaries other than do/does/did can be used, but there is no subject pronoun What has happened? (NOT What it has ...) because the question word is the subject.

What will happen? (NOT What it will ...)

But do not use do/does/did in questions if who/what/which is the subject of the sentence Compare:

Compare: I don't know... / Can you tell me...? etc.), it loses the normal question word order. When the question (Where has Tom gone?) is part of a longer sentence (Do you know...? but Do you know where Tom has gone? (not 'Do you know where has Tom gone?')

Where can I find Linda? Who is that woman? What time is it? but Do you know what time it is? don't know who that woman is

Use if or whether where there is no other question word (what, why etc.): Did anybody see you? but Do you know if (or whether) anybody saw you?

The same changes in word order happen in reported questions:

direct The police officer said to us, 'Where are you going!?

direct reported The police officer asked us where we were going

reported Clare wanted to know what time the banks closed Clare said, 'What time | do the banks close ?'

In reported questions, the verb usually changes to the past (were, closed). See Unit 46

We can be more polite or tentative by beginning a question with a phrase like Do you know Do you think/feel, Do you mind telling me, Could you tell me, Could I ask you, I'd like to know I was wondering

The word order of an indirect question is like a normal statement direct: Could you call me a taxi?

direct: How old are you? indirect: Could I ask you how old you are? indirect: Do you think you could call me a taxii

Where there is no question word or modal verb we use if or whether direct: Does Jane still work here? indirect: Do you know if Jane still works here?

F Prepositions in questions

 The preposition comes in the same place as in a statement, following the main verb, and this is Where do you come from? What are you looking at? Who are you waiting for? often at the end.

Question tags (do you? isn't it? etc.)

Study these examples:

You haven't seen Mary today, have you? No, I'm afraid not.



We use do/does/did for the present and past simple (see also Unit 50): sentence in spoken English). In question tags, we use an auxiliary verb (have/was/will etc.). Have you? and wasn't it? are question tags (= mini-questions that we often put on the end of a

- 'Karen plays the piano, doesn't she?' 'Well, yes, but not very well.'
- 'You didn't lock the door, did you?' 'No, I forgot.'

Normally we use a negative question tag after a positive sentence:

Jim should pass the exam, There was a lot of traffic, Mary will be here soon, positive sentence + negative tag shouldn't he? wasn't there? won't she?

.. and a positive question tag after a negative sentence:

You haven't got a car, negative sentence + Mary won't be late, They don't like us, have you? do they? will she? positive tag

Notice the meaning of yes and no in answer to a negative sentence:

. You're not going out today, are you? No. (= No, I am not going out) Yes. (= Yes, I am going out)

really asking a question; you are only inviting the listener to agree with you: The meaning of a question tag depends on how you say it. If your voice goes down, you aren't

- 'It's a nice day, isn't it?' 'Yes, lovely.
- 'Tim doesn't look well today, does he?' 'No, he looks very tired.'
- She's very pretty. She's got beautiful eyes, hasn't she?

But if the voice goes up, it is a real question:

'You haven't seen Mary today, have you?' 'No, I'm afraid not. (= Have you seen Mary today by any chance?)

 You haven't got a pen, have you? 'Yes, here you are.' We often use a negative sentence + positive tag to ask for things or information, or to ask

- 'You couldn't do me a favour, could you?' 'It depends what it is.
- 'You don't know where Karen is, do you?' 'Sorry, I've no idea

After Let's... the question tag is ...shall we?:

Let's go for a walk, shall we?

After the imperative (Do... / Don't do... etc.), the tag is usually ...will you?: Open the door, will you? Don't be late, will you?

Note that we say ...aren't I? (= am I not?):

• I'm late, aren't I?
