- It's a year since a group of gunmen went on a killing spree in Mumbai. The attacks, which began on 26 November 2008 and lasted nearly three days, left 174 people dead, including nine gunmen. On Thursday, Mumbai's policemen and commandos marched in a parade and displayed the force's newly acquired equipment, including amphibious patrol boats and "rapid intervention" vehicles, reports the BBC's Prachi Pinglay in the city.
- **Top German soldier Wolfgang Litz stood down** over the 4 September attack in Kunduz on fuel tankers hijacked by the Taliban. His decision followed reports that information about the strike ordered by a German commander was withheld, the defence minister said. The strike is thought to have killed dozens of civilians collecting fuel.

- The new tyre labelling regulation was adopted by the European Parliament on Wednesday. Tyre firms will have to display tyre performance data in advertisements. The use of better tyres might produce the same CO2 emissions cut as taking 1.3 million cars off EU roads.
- A survey for the Department of Health found almost one in five people in England admitted to exercising to "make up" for a heavy bout of drinking. But the government's Know Your Limits campaign is trying to impress upon people that while exercising may make you feel better, it does not undo the damage caused by serious alcohol consumption.

- Domenico Raccuglia was arrested in an apartment in a tiny town near Trapani, where he is believed to have had his Cosa Nostra power base, police said. He was convicted of killing a rival's son, whose body was thrown into acid. Italian Interior Minister Roberto Maroni described Raccuglia as Cosa Nostra's No 2, and said his arrest was "one of the hardest blows" to the Sicilian Mafia in the last few years. The most wanted fugitive remains Matteo Messina Denaro, who officials believe has a powerbase in western Sicily.
- The Nevsky Express derailed with nearly 700 on board as it ran through remote countryside between the capital Moscow and the second city, St Petersburg. "Criminology experts say, on the basis of preliminary information, that an improvised explosive device, equivalent to 7kg of TNT, had gone off," said Alexander Bortnikov, head of Russia's domestic intelligence service. At least three of the 14 carriages left the tracks as the train reportedly approached speeds up 200 km/h. Officials said it is a train popular with government officials and business executives.
- Spending by US consumers increased by 0.7% compared with the previous month, said the Commerce Department, more than market expectations of a 0.5% gain. The rise followed the 0.6% decline seen in September following the end of the US car scrappage scheme. The rebound in consumer spending came

- despite the most recent official figures showing that the unemployment rate in the US rose to 10.2% in October, the highest rate since April 1983.
- The futuristic vehicles will carry passengers from the business car park into Terminal Five in less than five minutes. The driverless taxi drives itself around a network of guideways using a combination of systems including laser sensors and computer controls.

Beijing said it would aim to reduce its "carbon intensity" by 40-45% by the year 2020, compared with 2005 levels. Carbon intensity, China's preferred measurement, is the amount of carbon dioxide emitted for each unit of GDP. But our correspondent says it does not mean China's overall levels of carbon dioxide will start falling. Its economy is still growing and is mostly fuelled by polluting coal, says the BBC's Quentin Sommerville in Beijing. It will be at least a couple of decades before China's emissions peak, so it is likely to remain the largest polluter for some time to come, he adds.

The dollar slipped to 86.5 yen, its lowest level since July 1995. The US has indicated it is unconcerned about the dollar's slide, and will not intervene to strengthen it. Many traders are swapping dollar holdings for gold as a safer investment.

World number one golfer Tiger Woods has been released from hospital after receiving treatment following a car accident in Florida on Friday. His car reportedly hit a fire hydrant and a tree as he left his drive. Woods, a 14-time major champion, is thought to have suffered facial cuts. An inquiry into the crash is under way.

- The court said Polanski could stay at his chalet in the Swiss Alps. He would be monitored by an electronic tag. Polanski, 76, has been wanted in the US since fleeing the country in 1978 after pleading guilty to having unlawful sex a year earlier with a 13-year-old girl. He was held in Zurich after travelling from France in September. Roman Polanski went to Switzerland to receive a lifetime achievement award.
- Manchester United see their 23-match unbeaten run at home in the Champions League ended by a 1-0 loss to Besiktas.
