- 2. What is the difference between an integral and non-integral citation? Give examples.

- 4. What tenses are commonly used with citations? Give examples.

- 1. Which referencing style (e.g. Harvard) does your department follow?
- 2. What do we need to reference in our writing? (And what don't we?)
- 3. Why is referencing important in academic writing? Think of at least three reasons.
- 4. What are the consequences of poor/no referencing in your work?
