Structure: Introduction, Main body, Results and Discussion (conclusion)

Introduction: info about the work, its aims, <u>thesis statement – estimation/paragraph</u> <u>division (outline)</u>, academic context, methodology

Write the outline / introduction last:

- Topic context, thesis statement, aims, methodology and outline/division of the work

Main body: analysis, paragraphs = 1 paragraph 1 idea – connector, statement, evidence, discuss, link------ elaborate the main argument, statement, idea, prediction

Chapters – intro and outline, conclusion and summary

Chapters – summary of the main concept and subchapters

Conclusion:

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results (<u>summary</u>), conclusion (I got these data and now they tell us this), discussion – questions for further research

Formal academic English

No idioms, no metaphors (that are unexplained carefully), contractions - it isn't //// it is not

Never use pronouns I, You, We, They

I – I believe / It leads an opinion, This work believes

You, We, They - more specific, do not include other unknown perspectives

Passive

Introduction, Conclusion – present simple (literary present)

Modal verbs – not much, strong vs weak verbs, synonyms, linkers – coherent, cohesive

Synonyms: studies, examines, analyze, discuss, elaborate, describe, portray, focus on, concentrate on,
