Chart 1 Applications allocated to a judicial formation per year




Chart 2 Applications pending before a judicial formation





Chart 7 Number of judgments since 2009



**Chart 3 High case-count States** 







Chart 9 Applications disposed of judicially in 2019



aid lost to fraud and corruption

The department responsible for overseas aid is losing millions of pounds of taxpayers' money through fraud and corruption because of poor financial management, an influential committee of MPs has found.

In a highly critical report published today the Public Accounts Committee now be much higher because Britain is refocusing its overseas aid to war-torn and difficult countries such as Somalia, Burma and Pakistan.

Most of the nine countries where aid is due to be increased by more than 50 per cent are judged to be at high risk of corruption. Others include Nigeria Pakistan and Ethiopia.

Margaret Hodge, the committee hairman, said that the Department for International Development was one of

only two ministries with extra funding this Parliament so it was vital that spending was not abused.

Although aid spending is due to increase by 35 per cent by 2013 the department also had to cut its adminis trative budget by a third creating a cocktail of trouble when combined

with the new areas of investment. "The department is going to be spending more in fragile and conflictaffected countries, and the danger to the taxpayer is that there could be an increase in fraud and corruption," Mrs Hodge said.

Last year the department lost more than filmillion as a result of fraud, double that in 2009-10. A further loss of £1.5 million has been identified since the end of last year, although this is expected to be recovered.

The committee claimed that the totals were "unbelievably low" and unlikely to be an accurate reflection of the level of fraud. It said that fraud had not been found in half the countries where aid was given.


