
WHAT IS PLAGIARISM?

- •Rewriting from books or articles
- •copying & pasting from web pages and online sources to create a patchwork writing
- •buying, downloading, or borrowing a paper

Accidental Plagiarism


- •not knowing when & how to cite
- •not knowing how to paraphrase or summarize
- •not knowing what "common knowledge" is
- •recycling an old paper
