### MAIN TURNING-POINTS

- the establishment of the Czechoslovak republic (1918)
- the second world war (1939 -1945)
- the communist take-over (1948)
- the collapse of communism (1989)
- the accession to the European Union (2004)



# 1918 the establishment of the Czechoslovak republic

- Act No. 11/1918 Coll. - reception of the law of the Austrian - Hungarian Empire    legal dualismus
  - Czech lands: CC - ABGB (1811)
  - Slovakia: Hungarian law (based on legal customs)
- +
- Act No. 320/1919 Coll., so called Marriage Amendment
  - Act No. 121/1920 Coll., Constitution (new principles: equality between a man and a woman, all children)
  - Act No. 56/1928 Coll., Adoption Act
  - 1937: legal steps for recodification of CC    failed



# 1939 - 1945 the second world war

(16. 3. 1939 - 8. 5. 1945)

- three categories of inhabitants:
  - German citizens
  - Citizens of Protectorate
  - Citizens under „racial“ rules from Norimberk (15. 9. 1935) on Protection on German Blood and German Honour prohibition of marriages between the German race and Jew
- property aspects
  - Act from 21. 6. 1939 on aryanize of Jewish property



# 1948 the communist take-over

- Act No. 150/1948 Coll., Constitution
- Soviet pattern - atomisation of legal order:
  - Act No. 265/1949 Coll., Family law Act
  - Act. No. 141/1950 Coll., CC
  - Act No. 59/1952 Coll., on Marrying Aliens
  - Act No. 69/1952 Coll., Children Act

- Act No. 94/1963 Coll., Act on the Family
- Act No. 40/1964 Coll., CC

# 1989 the collapse of communism

- the access to the Human Right Conventions
- Amendments to the Act No. 100/1960 Coll., Constitution
- Act No. 23/1991 Coll., Charter of Fundamental Rights and Freedoms
- Act No. 509/1991 Coll., great amendment to CC
- Act No. 234/1992 Coll., amendment to AF (civil wedding)

## Establishment of the Czech republic

- *reception of old laws of the Czechoslovak Republic*
- Act No. 1/1993 Coll., Constitution
- Act No. 2/1993 Coll., Charter of Fundamental Rights and Freedoms
- Act No. 91/1998 Coll., great amendment to AF (no ideology, new conception of divorce, parental responsibility, guardianship, maintenance, adoption etc. + community of property of spouses)
- Act No. 359/1999 Coll., Children Act



## 2004 the accession to the European Union

- 1st May 2004
- major changes occurred after 1989 - human rights dimension of interpretation and application
- old laws from 60' still in force (AF, CC)

- Act No. 115/2006 Coll., on Registered partnership

# The Civil Code - structure

- I. Part: General Provisions
- II. Part: Right related to Things:
  - § 143 - § 151 Community of Property of Spouses
- III. - V. Parts: repealed
- VI. Part: Liability for Damage and Unjust Enrichment
- VII. Part: Inheritance
- VIII. Part: The Law of Obligations
  - § 703 ff. Joint Lease of a Flat by Spouses
- IV. Part: Concluding, Transitional and Repealing Provisions

Legislative Intention of Ministry of Justice  
No. 2623/00-L from 29. 1. 2001

the new Civil Code



- almost 20 years of expectation of a full reform
- early 1990's: *prof. Knapp and prof. Plank*
- middle of 1990's: *prof. Zoulik*
- 2001: *prof. Eliáš*
  - great support of government
  - the draft: [www.justice.cz](http://www.justice.cz), [www.psp.cz](http://www.psp.cz)
  - end of 2009 - Parliament
  - family law: the second part of „draft“ Civil Code
  - discontinuity with communist law
  - comeback to European Legal Traditions
