Federal Court Appointment Process

- 1. Department of Justice keeps a file on likely candidates, getting names from Senators and other important party leaders.
- 2. Informal investigation conducted with outsiders by the Deputy Attorney General.
- 3. Names of leading candidates sent to the American Bar Association (ABA), Standing Committee on the Federal Judiciary.

- 4. Decision is made by the Attorney General; Department of Justice consults informally with the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee.
- 5. FBI investigation.
- 6. Recommendation from the Attorney General to the President.

- 8. Senate Judiciary Committee confirmation hearings, vote, report to the full Senate, final vote.
- 9. If confirmed by the Senate, to the President for signature.
