Literary Analysis of Two Passions (continued)

The Passion of Polykarpos (BHG 1556-1560)

- Contextualization of the text: author; place, time and characters of the story
- Christian virtues of the protagonist
- Similarities between the passion of Polykarpos and the passion of Christ
 - Imitatio Christi
- "Caesar is lord" (p. 9)
- The depiction of the Jews in the text
- Phases of martyrdom
- Intra-textual (bystanders) extra-textual audience (listeners/readers)

Literary Analysis of Two Passions (continued)

The Passion of Perpetua and Felicity (BHG 1482)

- Contextualization of the text: authors; place, time and characters of the story
- Emotions (esp. father, Perpetua)
- The special spiritual status of Perpetua (ch. IV, VII, IX, pp. 127-129)
- Visions Reality; the visions' role in the story
- The vision with the Egyptian man (ch. X, pp. 129-130)
- The common features between the two female characters of the story
- "a second baptism" (ch. XVIII, p. 133, cf. ch. XXI, p. 134)
- The end of Perpetua (beheading)

The World of the Desert: Male and Female Hermits

Literary Analysis: the Life of Mary of Egypt (BHG 1042), transl. by Maria Kouli

After reading the text, you should be able to discuss the following topics:

- Contextualization of the text: author; place, time and characters of the story
- The main function of the text ('message') (pp. 65-66)
- The encounter between Mary and Zosimas, their reactions and first impressions
- The ascetic virtues of Zosimas and Mary
- Structure of the text: Mary begins with her own narration (p. 80), interrupting the general narration of the author-narrator. The words of the female protagonist serve as a 'narrative parenthesis' and form the core of the entire story.
- The most important phases in the life of Mary:
 (1) sinful life, (2) repentance and conversion, and (3) ascetic way of life

After reading the text, you should be able to discuss the following topics (continued):

- The reason of her conversion and the episode at the church
- Depiction of diametrical opposite ends: sins vs. piety

sexual addiction vs. devotion to God and pilgrimage

living as a prostitute vs. living as a holy woman

- The death of Mary and the end of the story
- How is the ascetic figure of Mary of Egypt depicted in Byzantine literature and art?
