Second, the inmates all know the song and are humming the song because no matter, your age, religion, nationality you can be united and stand as one in between the ivory walls of the prison. Because like in the movie it is us vs them and we must stand together to end this. Also, as the scene ends the long single dolly shot creates a sense of time, very similar to the amount of time some of them will be serving in the prison. Finally, the slow clap to encourage Isaam to come back out of his cell is powerful because they are all being cheered on and supported by one another in this demonstration of unity.

The film plot is about how prisoners are manipulated to turn against one another by a commanding warden who plays with the emotions of inmates where is goal is to get a result he is looking for. The climax of the film is when one of the inmates killed another but was set up as either a Jew or an Arab killed him yet this was a plan developed by the warden to see who would crack under his plan. Finally, the falling action is when the community of the prison stands up against the warden on a hunger strike and even denies being released or seeing their family, due to their bond and unity they have built through this demonstration.
